Proposed Cuts to County Highways Services

The County Highways team are responsible for the maintenance of: 8,000 miles of roads; 3,500 bridges; 1,750 retaining walls; 75,000 street lights; 3,200 miles of footpaths and cycleways; and 180,000 drains and gullies. Since 2009 the highways budget has been reduced by £18.5m. We already know that they will need to reduce their budget by a further £10m over the next three proposals and that no final decision has yet been years.

They have therefore concluded that the level of service and maintenance they provide cannot remain as it is and they are currently exploring ways to reduce the number of roads that they have to maintain.

Chudleigh is one of four pilot areas across Devon where County Highways are proposing to stop maintaining certain roads. The criteria for so doing is that they do not serve houses, that the road is little used and that there are alternative routes available. Six roads have been potentially identified as suitable for stopping maintenance:

- The road that bears right from Rattycombe Farm to Higher Ranscombe
- The far end of Parrs Lane
- From Biddlecombe Cross to the Winstow Plantation
- From Higher Dunscombe to the A380

What a response! Thank you Chudleigh! Originally a Christian initiative, the appeal spread like ripples in a pond as it was taken out to the community.

Time was short, but everything was covered. Publicity; people with bags of clothes-sometimes one item, sometimes a car load; money to pay for the lorry; hours and hours of time that people donated to sorting and packing; banana boxes, several people scoured the local supermarkets to find enough; the provision of a van and two drivers; nothing was missing, right down to the last delicious detail of two friends who baked cakes and biscuits to sustain those sorting and packing.

230 boxes were collected. The van was loaded on Monday evening and at 7.30am Tuesday morning the drivers arrived. We prayed and waved them off on their journey to Brighton, where Samara, the young mum whose vision it was, met them. The boxes filled the storage unit. 'Our' boxes joined an 8th lorry leaving Brighton on 4th February, heading for Kirkuk.

Samara has received an email from the Pastor in Kirkuk, saying IS has attacked the oil-rich city but Pashmerga forces have so far protected them. He is 'so happy' and encouraged to know that this aid is on its way.

Thank you all so much for helping—and an extra special 'thank you' to 7 year old Toby for giving away his precious red blanket.

There is a large map in the entrance lobby to the Town Hall which clearly shows the exact locations of each of these roads.

It needs to be emphasised that these are made. The Town Council has been asked to consult local people to get their views and also to identify any other roads in the parish that would be little missed if they were no longer maintained.

If the decision is taken to cease maintaining any or all of the roads listed there will be no immediate visible impact. Over a period of time, pot holes will form and the tarmac will break down until a point is reached where it will become unsuitable for motor vehicles. This will take many years.

Amenity Society News

In January, CADAS members and guests heard about the role of a regional airport and the challenges it faces, from Stephen Ayres, Communications Manager for Exeter Airport, who has seen many changes in his 14 years at the airport.

Exeter airport was officially opened in 1937, but became RAF Exeter in Fighter Command in 1939 when it was requisitioned by the Air Ministry. It saw much activity during the war, both defending Exeter and carrying out offensive operations into occupied France before returning to civil use in 1946.

In 1952 scheduled services to Channel Islands began; in 1999 the new arrivals building was opened by Princess Ann; and in 2003 a new departure lounge was built, with an extension to the check-in area in 2005. Currently, a new executive lounge and boarding gate area are being built.

With 40,000 movements per year, including inbound routes attracting many tourists to the South West, Exeter is the main aviation hub in the South-West and one of the fastest growing airports in the UK, directly employing over 250 staff. It hosts Flybe HQ and training academy plus a Hilton Hotel, and makes £100m annual contribution to the local economy.

Passengers can fly to 40 (mainly European) destinations ranging from daily flights, weekly ones and some specialist holidays including Lapland in December.

A very popular internal service is to London City (formerly Docklands), from where the Docklands Light Railway will whisk passengers away to meetings or retail therapy. Tickets are priced to compete with rail options while the transit time is vastly reduced.

Other UK internal flights are scheduled to Belfast, Dublin, Edinburgh, Guernsey, and the Isles of Scilly. Royal Mail flights operate to East Midlands and Stansted nightly.

A new centre has also been built to service the growing number of private aircraft from the UK and abroad with their VIP passengers including royalty and celebrities (notably, Steven Spielberg when he was filming War Horse on Dartmoor).



On a cold February morning four of us set out to walk the Exe Estuary Trail. Not all of it; just enough to get to lunch. Starting from Darts Farm, we followed the trail to Exton, crossing the Clyst estuary by way of the 3m wide wooden walking and cycling bridge. Unlike a previous walk, organised by the RSPB and free, there were few birds in evidence. After a slow, two mile stroll we came to the Puffing Billy at Exton. This is a lovely pub turned into a restaurant.

The menus are extensive and therefore it took some time to decide, but mulled wine and real ales kept us occupied in the meantime. For starters, two of us chose scallops, one duck pancake and one mussels. All were well presented and tasty. For mains two had steak and oyster pie, one hake and chips and the fourth scallops as a main; again we were all well satisfied. The steak and oyster pie was a particular treat as this traditional dish is very rare. We decided not to have dessert. The total with drinks came to around £25 per head but there is also a two-course set lunch option at £14.95.

Our walk back took us via Bowling Green Marsh and the RSPB bird hide. On this particular day we had it to ourselves and spent some time trying to identify the hundreds of ducks on the water. This is well worth a visit

Having missed dessert we had coffee and cake back at Darts Farm. Their Bakewell Tart and Bakewell Tart Cheesecake were particularly good. The bill here was around £5.00 per head. Not a cheap lunch but the walk is well worth the effort with two very good food destinations available. If you want to go to the Puffing Billy in the evening there is a large car park attached.

There were a total of 9 Crimes recorded for Chudleigh during the last reporting period, broken down as follows:

- **Distribution of an indecent photograph:** An offender posted a photo of an ex partner without permission. There was insufficient evidence to prove an offence had been committed.
- Possession of an offensive weapon: A male was found in possession of a lock knife and has been charged.
- Assault causing Actual Bodily Harm: 2 males assaulted a taxi driver before running off in an unknown direction. Poor description of the suspects was given, so no further enquiries.

- Criminal damage to vehicles: 3 separate vehicles in different locations and on different dates have been damaged. No suspects or witnesses; all enquires are complete.
- Sending a false message by public electronic communications network: On 2 separate occasions messages have been sent via mobile phone by unknown persons and withheld numbers. There are no lines of enquiry.
- **Arson:** A small amount of straw was set alight and burnt in a 3 sided barn by unknown persons sometime during a 4 week period. There are no lines of enquiry.

News from the Town Council: Items not covered elsewhere in this issue

- Every four years Town and Parish councils are required to hold elections. That time is now nearly upon us. Electors who wish to stand for the council are required to nominate themselves. The nomination pack is available from Teignbridge District Council on 01626 215104 or electoralservices@teignbridge.gov.uk. The nominations have to be returned to the District Council by 9th April 2015. Chudleigh Town Council consists of 13 councillors. If there are 13 nominations or fewer, then all those nominated are automatically elected unopposed. If there are more than 13 nominations then there will be a contested election. This will take place on 7th May—the same date as the General Election.
- The frequency with which drain across the County are cleared has been reduced from every twelve months to every three years. The exceptions to that in Chudleigh are the main gritting route (the main road through the town) and Woodway Street which will continue to be done every twelve months. Blocked drains can still be reported, but each report has to be assessed by the highways officer before an ad hoc drain clearance is carried out. This will only be done if the blockage is likely to lead to the flooding of property.
- The postponed resurfacing work on Station Hill is due to commence on Wednesday 25th March for two nights (between 7pm and 6am). The works will be carried out under temporary traffic lights with intermittent slip road closures as they work across these junctions.
